What we are learning about?

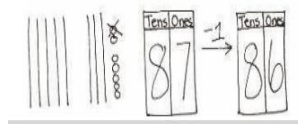
Reading: Students will describe Daniel Boone and the Appalachian Mountains; Students will describe Daniel Boone's adventures as a trailblazer; Students will explain why Thomas Jefferson wanted to buy the city of New Orleans; Students will explain the significance of the Louisiana Territory and the Louisiana Purchase.



Math: Use the place value chart to record and name tens and ones within a two-digit number up to 100; Write and interpret two-digit numbers to 100 as addition sentences that combine tens and ones; Identify 10 more, 10 less, 1 more, and 1 less than a two-digit number within 100. Lesson 6: Use the symbols $>$, $=$, and $<$ to compare quantities and numerals to 100; Count and write numbers to 120. Use Hide Zero cards to relate numbers 0 to 20 to 100 to 120; Count to 120 in unit form using only tens and ones. Represent numbers to 120 as tens and ones on the place value chart.

$>$	Greater Than	When the number on the left is larger than the number on the right.	$67 > 66$
$<$	Less Than	When the number on the left is smaller than the number on the right.	$56 < 89$
$=$	Equal To	When the numbers on both sides are the same.	$22 = 22$
