EXECUTIVE COUNCIL OF SUPERINTENDENTS

On March 21st, Superintendents from the five school districts that represent the RAMPED consortium met over breakfast at the KCISD "Learning Center" (blue bldg.). Much constructive and fruitful discussion was had throughout the meeting regarding how to maximize the potential of opportunities provided by the grant. The Executive Council serves to satisfy a grant requirement for years 2-5, serve as an additional stakeholder in the success of RAMPED, gage program effectiveness in collaboration with the Advisory Council, and to serve as an additional monitor and decision-maker towards ensuring alignment with policies and regulations. Information was provided to superintendents regarding items discussed during the Advisory Council meeting, as well as results of the survey that was completed by that Council. Finally, the group of district leaders brainstormed, then identified different strategies towards relaying to their district staffs and communities, their commitment to "GROWING THEIR STAFFS." These strategies will be shared with all stakeholders soon! The Advisory and Executive Council will gather as a group in May to speak to program status. - Dr. B.








RAMPED ADVISORY COUNCIL UPDATE

On March 19th, the RAMPED Advisory Council convened at the KCISD Board Room. The Council includes campus principals, and business and parent representatives from the five school districts served by the RAMPED Grant. The role of the Advisory Council is to not only to satisfy a grant requirement in years 2-5, but to provide additional stakeholders, and source of insight and feedback towards gaging program status. During the meeting, information was shared with the group regarding status of different grant components, new second year developments and a review of the government approved amended Y2 budget. Finally, a survey was completed by members, the results then shared with Executive Council of Superintendents later in the week. In May, the Advisory and Executive Councils will meet together to participate in a status check of the program. - Dr. B.

How Can We Recognize the Signs of Student Distress

According to the CDC data, in 2019 over one-third of high school students had experienced persistent feelings of sadness or hopelessness. Early detection helps get early intervention and keeps the student mentally healthy. The following are signs to look out for from Mental Health America:

- Problems with concentration
- · Changes in appetite
- Complaints of headache/ stomachache with no known cause
- · Loss of interest in things that they used to enjoy
- Excessive worry
- Irritability or restlessness
- · Changes in sleep
- Angry outbursts
- Not wanting to be around people or take part in activities
- · Mood swings or frequent shifts in energy
- Extreme panic

According to Mental Health America, 50% of all people who will have a mental health disorder in their lifetime start to experience symptoms by age 14. 












PROFESSIONAL ENHANCEMENT AND DEVELOPMENT

Social Work: Stories from the Field from the Field

This past month, Emma Bennet completed her second semester of field internship. Emma is a fast-track student at Our Lady of the Lake so she quickly had to jump in after the holidays to complete her hours before Spring Break. Emma is our first Resident to complete two semesters. She plans to walk the stage this May along with Keyerah Barnes who is scheduled to complete her field hours by the end of April. These two individuals have set some high expectations for future Social Work Residents. This past month they scheduled a guest speaker from Toyota to present to one of our Future Focused high school groups. The presenter shared opportunities for employment after graduation as well as continuing education through the TxFAME program at St. Phillips. We also have two Generalist Residents from UTSA working on campuswide initiatives. They are working on a 3-part series presentation for 6th-10th graders, reaching out to parents for attendance concerns, organizing a food/ clothing pantry, and assisting with guidance lessons. All Social Work Residents had the opportunity to meet with our grant evaluator to learn more about qualitative and quantitative data and how it can continue to be used in their future as social workers to tell their stories of success and struggles. One of my favorite quotes from the conversation is "Be a freckle, not a pimple." This was used to describe grant work on a campus meaning to blend into the environment and be seen as part of the system, not to be something to pop out.
