Some of the accident producing situations he show were: standing on damp ground or wet concrete while using fault elec-

trical equipment.

He then gave several good rules to prevent accidents which happen inside and outside the house. The suggestions he made were: unplug the toaster before cleaning, don't use an aluminum lader near electric lines, fly your kite away from power lines, and stay away from fallen power lines.

To prevent many accidents people should make sure that their electrical syste m grounded and the wires are pro-perly connected on all stationary and most portable appliances and tools. People should consider the safety benefits of electricity.

The Badger baseball team opened the 1973 season with a "come from behind" victory over Luling. The game was played Friday evening at Luling.

The Badgers fell behind quickly in the first inning by two runs. The Eagles held their lead only until the third inning when the Badgers broke loose with four runs. The team then increased their lead to four runs in the 3rd inning to hold a 6-2 lead.

Thomas Cisneros pitched the entire game, and allowed only four hits. Two of these came in the first inning, the only rough moment in the game for the Badlers, while Cisneros held the Luling team intact. The game ended with the Badgers on top, 6-2.

This concludes my question and answer session once again but before I close I would like to answer one question that has been asked to me several times. Why are you conceded in your column?


My answer is, "I'm not conceded in my column. Just because I know it all and you all don't know anything, so you think I am a conceded columnist.
